What's your favorite way to spread a little kindness? And what are you thankful for today?

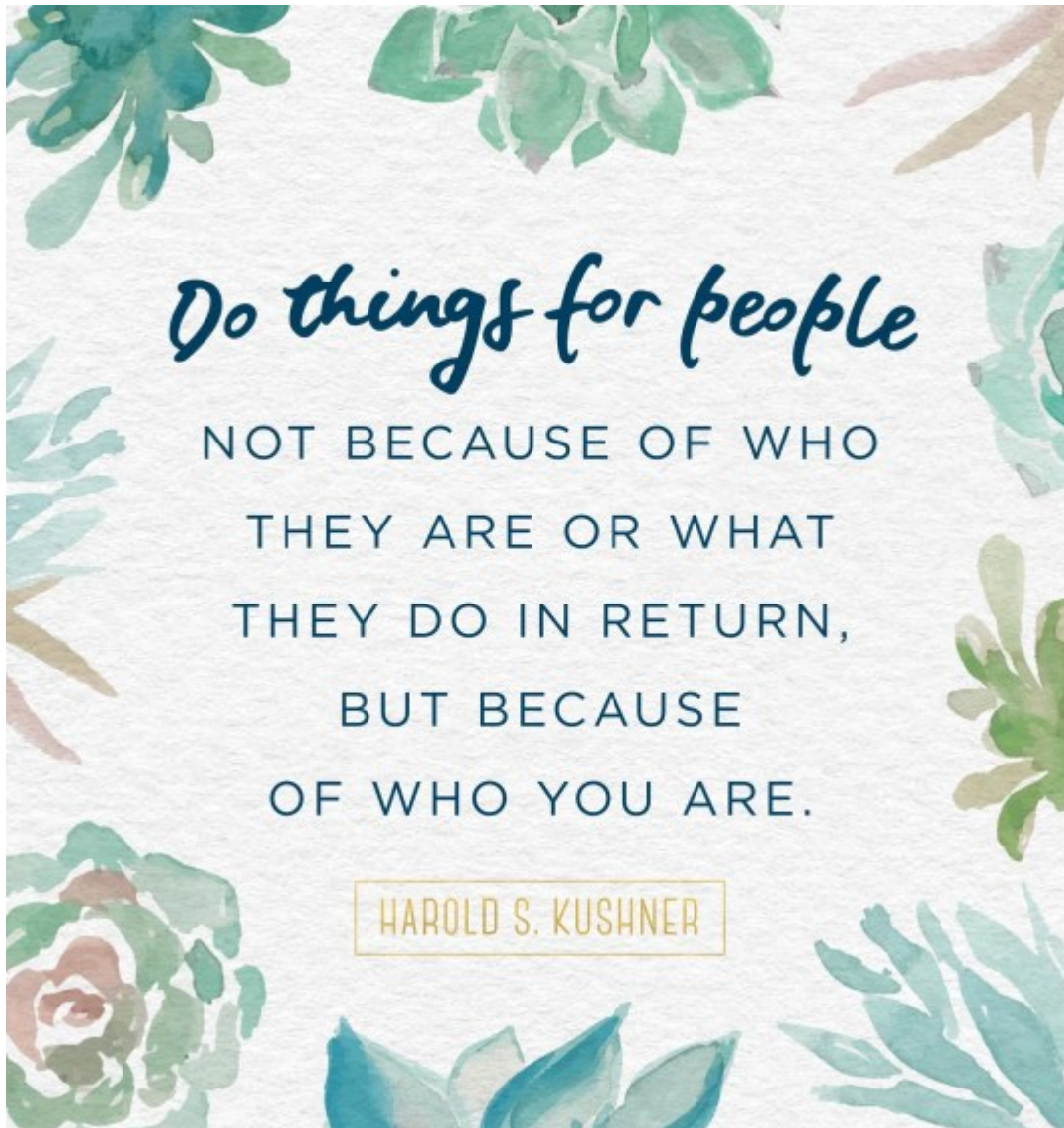
