I am so immensely grateful for my faith.

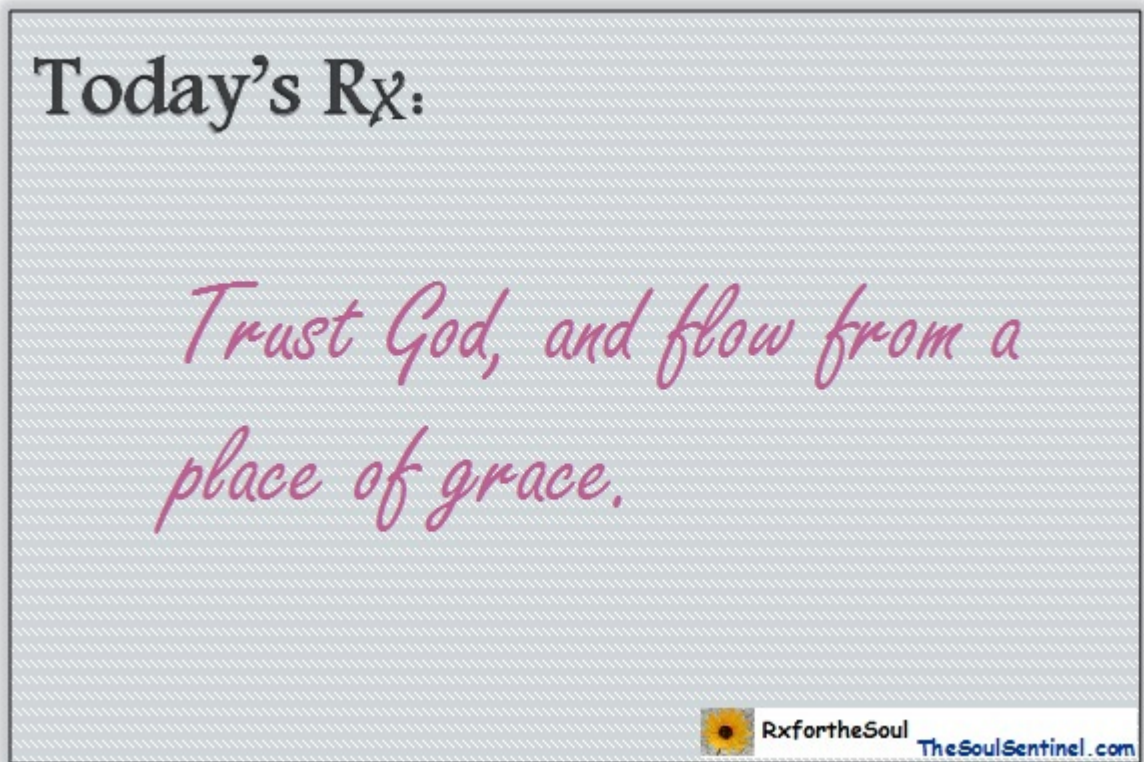
